


WELCOME TO THE FAMILY OF KODAK CAMERA OWNERS!

Your new STYLELITE Pocket Camera gives you the convenience of built-in electronic flash. The camera has a fixed-focus lens from 5 feet to infinity, which means no settings.

CHECK THE CAMERA SHUTTER EVERY TIME BEFORE YOU PUT A FILM CARTRIDGE INTO THE CAMERA.


Push sliding lens cover until it snaps into fully open position.



- Push the FILM ADVANCE ONCE.
- Open the FILM-COMPARTMENT DOOR and aim the camera at a bright object—lamp, sky, etc.
- While looking through the back of the empty camera, press the SHUTTER RE-LEASE.
- You should see a flicker of light as the SHUTTER opens and closes. Try this procedure a couple of times if you're not sure of seeing the shutter opening and closing.

TO USE YOUR CAMERA, SIMPLY DO THIS:




OPEN the FILM-COMPARTMENT DOOR by depressing the DOOR LATCH and lowering the door.




INSERT a film cartridge into the camera. Close the door until it locks with the camera body.

Note: Don't force the door beyond its fully open position. If the door comes off the camera, reinstall it by pressing it into place.



PUSH the FILM ADVANCE repeatedly until the first exposure locks into place. You may have to press the SHUTTER RELEASE before advancing the film. The lens cover must be fully open and locked into the detent to operate the shutter release.

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NOTE arrows in the WINDOW as you advance the film. The numbers that you see serve as an exposure counter.

Important: Always operate the film advance until it locks, in order to take the next picture.




Slide the LENS COVER as far as it will go until it snaps into the open position. See cover foldout. Aim through the eye-level viewfinder for a bright, clear image of your subject. Frame your subject within the viewfinder. Hold the camera steady and gently s-g-u-e-e-z-e the shutter release.

FOR FLASH PICTURES

Set the ON/OFF switch at OFF. Use 2 AA-size alkaline batteries for best results. Before installing any batteries. clean the ends by rubbing them with a rough cloth. Slide the BATTERY-COMPARTMENT COVER in the direction of the arrow and remove it. Insert the batteries (one with the + end facing out, the other with the - end facing out) as shown by the symbols inside the BATTERY COMPARTMENT. Hold the batteries down and slide the cover fully onto the camera.

Note: Remove batteries if unit is not to be used for any length of time.





READY LIGHT

Move the switch to ON to charge the flash. The READY LIGHT will blink in the viewfinder (at the right) and on top of the camera to indicate that the flash is ready to fire. Do not take flash pictures before the ready light blinks or your pictures will be dark (underexposed). See page 11 for flash distances

NEVER FORCE ANY CAMERA OPERATION; CHECK INSTRUCTIONS FOR OPERATION.

Before you take any especially important pictures, expose a cartridge of film and have it processed to check the camera and your operation of it. Take pictures outdoors as well as indoors with flash.

Store your camera and film away from heat and direct sunlight—not on the rear-window shelf, or any other "hot spot" in a car.

read on for important instructions

KODAK Films	Use 110-size film cartridges. The films listed below are for picture-taking with daylight or electronic flash.
Color Prints	KODACOLOR II Film (C110) is a general-purpose picture-taking film. KODACOLOR 400 Film (CG110) is a high-speed (all-purpose) film that can be used in light conditions ranging from bright sunlight to heavy overcast or light shade. Its speed lets you stop action at high shutter speeds and extend the distance range of your flash pictures.
Color Slides	KODACHROME 64 Film (KR110) and KODAK EKTACHROME 64 Film (ER110) are for color slides. They are not generally recommended for this camera.
Black-and- White Prints	KODAK VERICHROME Pan Film (VP110) is for general picture-taking in most situations.







Holding the camera as shown, frame your subject within the viewfinder.

DAYLIGHT PICTURES

When you are using a film such as KODACOLOR II Film, your subjects should be in bright or hazy sunlight (with the sun behind you).

If you use a high-speed film such as KODACOLOR 400 Film, you can take pictures in daylight ranging from bright sunlight to open shade. In heavy overcast or shady conditions when it is questionable whether you have enough light, use the electronic flash. This film can also extend the distance for your indoor flash picture-taking. Refer to the flash table on page 11.

Fill-in Flash—In some outdoor picture-taking situations, shadows may appear on the faces of your subjects. To help lighten these shadows, use the electronic flash when taking your picture.

Be sure you are within the flash range for the film you're using any time you are taking flash pictures.

For sharp pictures, hold your camera steady by grasping it with both hands; then gently s-q-u-e-e-z-e the shutter release. Don't jerk the camera by punching the shutter release, or you will blur your pictures! Keep your hands and the wrist strap behind the front of the camera so that you don't block the lens and the electronic flash.

Note: Removing and replacing partially exposed cartridges, even under darkroom conditions, will result in the loss of at least one exposure.

DOUBLE-EXPOSURE PREVENTION

You never lose a picture by doubleexposing a frame. After taking a picture, you must operate the film advance until it locks before you can take another picture.

ELECTRONIC FLASH

Your camera features easy electronic flash picture-taking. To take full ad-



vantage of your electronic flash, read the following instructions.

ON/OFF Switch—Set the switch at OFF whenever you are replacing batteries and are not taking flash pictures.

Installing Batteries—Set the switch to OFF. Use 2 AA-size alkaline batteries for best results. Check the batteries when you buy them to be sure that they are fresh. Before installing any batteries, clean the ends by rub-



bing them with a rough cloth.

Slide the BATTERY-COMPARTMENT COVER in the direction of the arrow to remove it. Insert the batteries (one with the + end facing out, the other with the - end facing out) as shown by the symbols on the inside of the BATTERY COMPARTMENT. Hold the batteries down and slide the cover fully onto the camera.

Note: Remove batteries if flash is not to be used for more than a month.



Ready Light-Set the ON/OFF SWITCH at ON to charge the flash. The BEADY LIGHT will blink (visible in the viewfinder and on top of the camera) to indicate that the flash is ready to fire. If the ready light doesn't blink within 30 seconds, make sure that the batteries are fresh and have been installed correctly. Do not take a flash picture before the ready light blinks. Otherwise, your pictures will be dark (underexposed).

Recycling Time-The time the batteries take to charge the unit for the next flash is called recycling time. When the ready light blinks, you know the unit is ready for your next picture. Fresh batteries will charge the unit faster than weak batteries. As the batteries lose strength or become dirty, recycling time will be longer and the flash range will be reduced. When the time to recycle becomes longer than 30 seconds, clean or replace the batteries. See Technical Details, page 24, for normal recycling time and the correct batteries.

If the unit has not been used for a month or longer, the time required to charge the unit the first time will be longer than normal. Minimizing Eye Reflections—When you take pictures with the electronic flash on your camera, people's eyes sometimes appear red (white in black-and-white pictures). The red is produced by reflections from the retina of the eye. This effect is especially noticeable when a young subject has light complexion and blue eyes—also when your subject is in a dimly lighted place.

Here are two ways in which you can minimize these red reflections: (1) turn on additional room lights, and (2) have your subject look directly at one of the room lights. This will cause the pupils of the eyes to contract slightly, reducing the reflection.


FLASH PICTURE-TAKING TIPS

- Wait for the ready light to blink. (See Ready Light, page 9.)
- Use flash only within the recommended flash range. (See Flashto-Subject Distance, at right.)
- Check the unit recycling time before you plan to use the unit. If the unit approaches 30 seconds for the ready light to blink, change the batteries.
- Turn unit off when you are not taking flash pictures.
- Remove batteries if unit is not to be used for any length of time.
- · Carry spare batteries with you.

FLASH-TO-SUBJECT DISTANCE

Note: When the recycling time becomes greater than 15 seconds, the flash range will be reduced. For maximum flash range, wait 30 seconds after ready light blinks.

Flash picture-taking with slide films is not recommended with this camera.





LENS COVER

Your camera has a built-in sliding LENS COVER to protect the lens. The cover must be fully open and locked into the detent to operate the shutter release.

To open the cover, slide it until it snaps into its fully open position. Close the cover to protect the lens and to guard against accidental shutter release when you are not using the camera.





WRIST STRAP

Attach the supplied WRIST STRAP to the camera by inserting the shorter looped end of the strap behind the POST. Then thread the longer end through the shorter loop, and pull the strap tight.



MONOGRAM

To form your MONOGRAM, peel off the initials and put them into the appropriate recesses as shown.

UNLOADING CAMERA AND FILM PROCESSING

When you have taken the last picture, operate the film advance (about 6 full strokes) until black paper appears in the camera window—you will feel a stiff resistance on the advance. **Do**

Not Force the Advance. Open the film-compartment door and remove the cartridge. If You Open the Cartridge, You'll Ruin Your Pictures.

For best results, have your exposed film processed as soon as possible. Have your photo dealer arrange for processing by Kodak or another laboratory, or use the appropriate Kodak Mailer, available from your dealer.

Color prints from Kodacolor Films (110 size) are usually 3½ x 4½ inches. Kodak Processing Laboratories return Kodacolor Film negatives (strips of 4) with an attached form for ordering extra prints or enlargements. When you order extra prints or enlargements, always return the uncut strip of 4 negatives.

CAMERA CARE

Clean the picture-taking and view-finder lenses by blowing away any dust or dirt. Then breathe on the lenses to form a mist, and gently wipe the mist away with a soft, clean, lintless cloth or use KODAK Lens Cleaning Paper moistened with KODAK Lens Cleaner or equivalent. Keep the lens cover closed when you are not using the camera.

Important: Never wipe or rub a dry lens. Always form a visible mist before wiping with a swab or you can scratch the lenses. Never use solvents or any solutions not designed for cleaning camera lenses, and don't use chemically treated tissues intended for eyeglasses.

SERVICE FOR YOUR CAMERA

If you have questions about your camera or have difficulty in using it, carefully reread the section of this instruction manual which pertains to the questions you have. ESPECIALLY be sure to consult the **Troubleshooting Guide** which begins on page 17. Since many cameras that are returned for repair do not need service, please carefully review this information.

If you believe your camera does need service—

Take your camera with the batteries and several sample negatives and prints to your photo dealer.

OR

Take your camera, batteries, negatives, and prints to a Kodak Consumer Center if one is located near you. The addresses are listed on pages 20 through 23.

OR

Send a letter describing the problem to Eastman Kodak Company, Department 841S, 343 State Street, Rochester, New York 14650. Please enclose sample negatives and prints with your letter to aid us in helping you, and be sure to specify the name of your camera. Quickly, we will provide you with help and return your negatives and prints.

If your camera requires repair, you may send it through your photo dealer or directly to one of our Service Centers listed on the back cover. Follow the steps below in packing your camera.

Packing Instructions

1. Include a note with your camera giving all details: date and place of purchase and a description of the problem, as well as batteries and sample negatives and prints.

If possible, include a telephone number where you or another person aware of the problem can be reached between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

- 2. Use a sturdy carton that is large enough for you to surround the camera completely with packaging material, such as crumpled newspaper.
- 3. Securely fasten the carton with tape. Clearly write the address of the Service Center and your name and address on the top and bottom of the carton.
- 4. Remember to insure the equipment to replacement value.

TROUBLESHOOTING GUIDE

Taking pictures with your camera is easy and enjoyable. If occasionally one of your pictures isn't all that you expected, refer to the chart below.

	(b) Subject movement	(b) Use high-speed film, such as KODACOLOR 400 Film. Subject must be stationary or moving very slowly toward or away from camera.
	(c) Too close to subject	(c) Keep at least 5 feet from subject.
